MEETING MINUTES TOWN OF LONGBOAT KEY CITIZEN TAX OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MEETING July 8, 2019

At 9:30 AM on Monday, July 8, 2019, a public meeting of the Town of Longboat Key Citizen Tax Oversight Committee commenced in the Commission Chamber located in Town Hall, 501 Bay Isles Road, Longboat Key, Florida.

Members attending: Leonard Garner (Chair), Cheryl Loeffler, Christopher Carman, Kevin Magnus attended in person and Penny Gold attended by phone.

Also attending: Budget Analyst Sandi Henley, Accounting and Budget Manager Elizabeth Ramsden and Town Deputy Clerk Savannah Shield.

Leonard Garner opened the meeting at 9:30 AM and no members of the public were present.

- 1. **SWEARING IN NEW APOINTEE.** New appointee Kevin Magnus was sworn in by Deputy Town Clerk Savannah Shield.
- **2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES.** Committee members reviewed the minutes of the 2018 meeting. A motion was made and seconded to accept the minutes and all members voted in favor.
- 3. FINANCE PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION. Discussion was led by Sandi Henley. Mr. Garner preceded Sandi's discussion to explain the new appointee a short description of the Tax Oversight committee functions. Sandi started the discussion with a review of the role of the committee, an explanation of what an infrastructure tax is, and a review of the permitted uses of the fund. Sandi noted that we are now in the third phase of the program which runs until the end of 2024. Sandi also provided background information of the previous years and where we are now. Sandi also explain what would come in the future and explain that the next round of infrastructure surtax uses will go out for referendum. Penny Gold asked what is the population trend, Sandi answered that the population maintains a steady trend. Sandi reviewed with the commission the budget for the Infrastructure III, Mr. Garner explained the rest of the board that the budget is determined by the County. Sandi also review with them the forecast. Kevin Magnus asked if the funds have a specific timeframe to be spent down each year. Sandi explained that we can carry a fund balance over as long as we fulfill the contract requirements of the period of time stipulated in the agreement. Mr. Garner also explained to Mr. Magnus that the Town Commission Board approves the spending and that the Tax Oversight Committee function is to make sure is spent correctly. Peggy Gold asked if we are looking into use any funds for the Arts Center. Sandi explained that the use is allowable,

but right now that is not being considered. Peggy Gold explained the role of the Ringling in the fundraising process and provided an update of the status of their involvement. Peggy also asked about how investments income is used. Sandi explained at a high level the Town invests according to Town policy and income is allocated through all the funds. Mr. Magnus also asked if the Town can make changes to the Infrastructure budget to spend down between categories. Sandi explained that its possible if it is approved by Town Commission through a Resolution (Public meeting).

- **4. REVIEW DRAFT OF MEMO TO TOWN COMMISSION:** Sandi covered the audited funds expenditures draft memo to the commission. Leonard Garner made a motion to approve annual report and submit the Resolution to the Commission. The motion was seconded and all voted in favor.
- 5. ADJOURNMENT: A motion was made to adjourn which was seconded and passed. The meeting was adjourned at 9:58 AM.

Infrastructure Surtax

TOWN OF LONGBOAT KEY

Overview

- The infrastructure surtax is a one-cent sales tax that funds many capital improvement projects.
- Expenditures shall comply with Florida Statutes Section 212.055 (2)
- It's imposed by most Florida counties, is also called local option county sales tax
- The rates varies in each county
 - Sarasota County 1%
 - Manatee County .5% (Effective Jan 1, 2017)
- Proceeds are distributed based on population



Background

- Sarasota County established the 1% Tax by Referendum
 - Ordinance 89-040 Term of 10 years (Fiscal Year 1989-1998)
 - Ordinance 97-083 Renewal Term of 10 years (Fiscal Year 1999-2009)
 - Ordinance 2007-087 Renewal Term of 15 years (Fiscal Year 2010-2024)
- Manatee County established .5% Tax by Referendum
 - Ordinance 16-35 Term of 15 years (Jan 1, 2017-Dec 31, 2031)
- Sarasota County provided an estimate of revenues for all municipalities in a 15 year budget



Citizens Tax Oversight Committee

- Formed in 1998 (Resolution 98-04) in Accordance with Sarasota County Ordinance 97-083 and 2007-087
- Committee shall act solely in an oversight capacity to conduct:
 - Annual Review of expenditures from sales tax proceeds to ensure they are in accordance with the project list and any changes thereto;
 - Review any changes made by the Town to the project list or to the allocation of the sales tax proceeds, to ensure all procedural requirements have been followed;
 - Report the Committee's findings to the Town Commission



Infrastructure Surtax Phase III

- Phase III Revenue collections began September, 2009 and end December 31, 2024 and are estimated at \$9,562,737.
- The Town sets aside all revenue in a special revenue fund.
- An Expenditure Budget was put in place for certain functional areas:
 - Comprehensive Beach Management
 - Streets and Drainage
 - Parks and Recreation Improvements
 - Canal Dredging
 - Public Safety
 - Improvements to Public Facilities



Permitted Uses of Funds

- To acquire land for public recreation, land conservation or for the protection of natural resources
- To finance, plan and construct capital assets and infrastructure.
- To finance the closure of government owned solid waste landfills

Infrastructure are costs associated with the construction, reconstruction or improvement of public facilities having a life expectancy of five or more years and any related land acquisition, land improvement, design and engineering costs.

- Using an excel forecasting model, the estimated Sarasota County surtax revenue is projected to increase by 3% per year from 2020 to 2024 (\$6 million since inception and \$4.0 million projected)
- COVID-19 is likely to have a negative impact on these projections.
